

Writing Navigator

The Writing Navigator guides students through the basics of the writing process using four critical steps:

Writing Planner uses a graphic organizer to get students thinking about their purpose, audience and main ideas.

Writing Drafter helps students transform their writing plan into an essay and think critically about purpose and audience Writing Reviser uses a language parser to analyze the student's work, focusing on essay structure alongside sentence economy, variety, power and clarity. Highlighting areas that may need revision, it helps students make informed decisions about their work.

Writing Publisher helps students proofread to correct errors in spelling, punctuation and capitalization, as well as spot omitted or repeated words. Converts research notes into MLA-style internal citations and

a Works Cited page.

Writing Reviser now available as a Google Docs add-on!

Many teachers have students write in Google Docs so they can easily share their work. Now, with the ability to open Writing Reviser as an add-on within Google Docs, students can call up the most popular resource in Curriculum Pathways* while they work.

Writing Reviser targets more than 20 potential problem areas, from the macro scale (e.g., thesis statements) to micro scale (e.g., diction). The new add-on embeds the tool in the writing process, helping students focus on editing goals like economy, variety, power and clarity – all without leaving the page.
